

Why Participate in the Foundation's Fellowship Programs?

Through a variety of scholarship, leadership training, and other programs, the Foundation each year provides tens of thousands of dollars in support to Circle K, KEY Club, Builders Club, and K-Kids in the Pacific Northwest. These funds are made available largely because of people like you who have participated in the Foundation's fellowship programs.

Purchasing a Fellowship for yourself or honouring someone else with a Fellowship is a way to support Kiwanis, the work of the Foundation, and — most importantly — to positively impact young people in the Pacific Northwest.

Fellowship recipients are honoured with a reception at each Pacific Northwest District Convention. The names of Fellowship recipients are published on the Foundation web site and in the Foundation annual reports. Fellowship pins and medallions can be worn with pride at Kiwanis events and other special occasions.

Plaques and other recognitions that your club may purchase to honor an individual usually have to be paid for out of administrative funds. Fellowships offer a more fitting way to honour someone who has contributed to the club or to the community because the recipient knows that the funds donated will serve to help children and youth. And as a Foundation donation, the full amount can come from the club's project account.

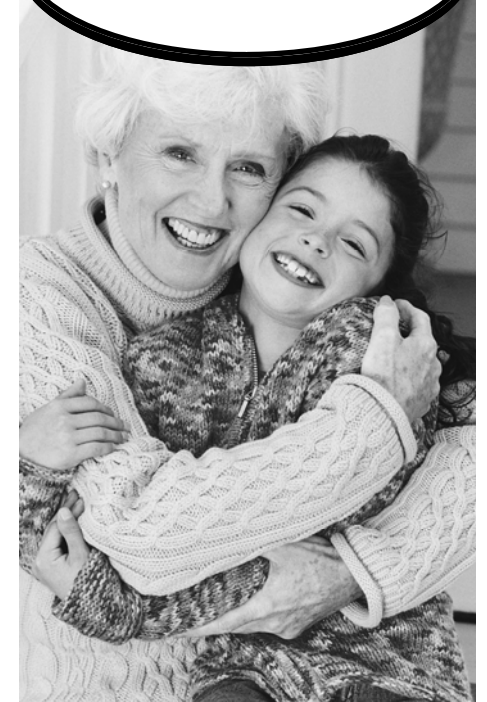

The Helping Hands Fellowship Awards

Helping Hands Fellowships

Helping Hands fellowships were developed to honor contributors to the Foundation, but donors may also choose to honor someone else.

Helping Hands Fellowships are available at the Bronze, Silver and Gold levels. Included with the fellowships are:

- Bronze, silver, or gold-coloured medallion on a red ribbon.
- A Foundation lapel pin

Contribution Levels

The contribution levels for Foundation fellowships are set out as follows:

Bronze	\$250 or more
Silver	\$500 or more*
Gold	\$750 or more*
RUSTY	\$1,000 or more*
EMMY	\$2,000 or more

Donations by U.S. citizens are tax deductible. Canadian donations are accepted at par.

* **Progressive:** Each level is progressive, which means you can move up from one level to another. For example, being a Silver Helping Hands fellow counts as \$500 towards the purchase of a Gold Helping Hands fellowship (net additional donation required: \$250).

The Joan "RUSTY" Clutts Fellowship Award

The "RUSTY" Fellowship

The Joan "RUSTY" Clutts fellowship is the second-highest honor available from the Pacific Northwest Kiwanis Foundation. Included with the fellowship are:

- Antique gold coloured medallion with a ruby red gemstone and a depiction of Joan "Rusty" Clutts on a red ribbon
- Matching lapel pin
- Shadow box

About Joan "RUSTY" Clutts

"RUSTY" Clutts was a strong supporter of the Pacific Northwest Kiwanis Foundation and one of the most giving and caring women in the history of the PNW District and Kiwanis International. Joan achieved the Diamond Thirty level Hixson Fellow status. She was dedicated to helping the children of the world through her thoughts, words, and deeds.

Joan "RUSTY" Clutts moved to Alaska with her husband, Chuck, in 1952 after serving in the Women's Army Corps and with military intelligence at the Pentagon during World War II. In 1963, she became a professor of education at the University of Alaska, teaching upper-division and graduate courses in education, language arts and administration. Upon her retirement in 1984, the university named her a professor emeritus of education. She was active in the Kiwanis Club of Chena Fairbanks and served as the Pacific Northwest's First Lady in 1984/85.

The J.N. Emerson "EMMY" Fellowship Award

The "EMMY" Fellowship

The J.N. Emerson fellowship is the highest honor bestowed by the Pacific Northwest Kiwanis Foundation. Included with the fellowship are:

- Antique gold coloured medallion with a depiction of J.N. Emerson on a red and white ribbon
- J.N. Emerson lapel pin
- Shadow box framed certificate

About J.N. Emerson

J.N. Emerson of the Kiwanis Club of Pullman was Pacific Northwest Governor in 1939 and Kiwanis International President in 1946-47. As International President, his first objective was to "consider every boy and girl an opportunity for Kiwanis service." He was determined to expand youth work by Kiwanis clubs, especially in relation to Circle K.

Ten years prior to becoming International President, J.N. Emerson founded what would become Circle K International. In 1936, he presented a plan to his club proposing that the Kiwanis Club of Pullman, WA, purchase a house that could be rented to young men in need of assistance to attend the local college. As a result, "Circle K House" was established at Washington State College. Circle K is now an international Kiwanis-sponsored, student-run volunteer organization with more than 12,000 students in 15 nations.

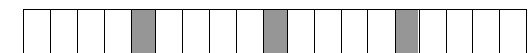
